CURRICULUM INCLUDES 29 IB COURSES, 28 AP COURSES, 27 HONORS COURSES AND COLLEGE CREDIT COURSES

THE SCHOOL:

The Cumberland Valley High School serves the four townships of Hampden, Middlesex, Monroe and Silver Spring in Cumberland County. The area included in the school system extends from Carlisle to Camp Hill, Pennsylvania. This area is essentially rural and suburban and is located fifteen miles west of Harrisburg. The school operates with a total of six principals; a head principal, an associate and one for each grade level 9th through 12th. Eight counselors are on staff; two per grade level who follow students all four years.

The combined junior-senior high school opened in September 1954 to 800 students. The school has steadily grown since that time. Current statistics for 9th through 12th grade are:

CLASS PERIODS:

Nine class periods are scheduled daily. Periods are 41 minutes in length, on a 6-day cycle for major subjects, 36 weeks a year.

CURRICULUM

In order for a student to graduate from Cumberland Valley High School he/she must complete the following: four credits in English, four credits in social studies, three credits in science, three credits in math, with one additional credit in math or science, two credits in arts and humanities, two credits in health/ physical education. Electives make up the balance of the twentythree credits required for graduation.

CURRICULUM BY DEPARTMENT

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAM—English, History of the Americas, Psychology, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Math, Math Studies, French, Spanish, German, Chinese, Art, Theory of Knowledge, Visual Arts

COLLEGE CREDIT COURSES: College Accounting, College Marketing, College Computer Applications. Advanced College Placement is offered through partnerships with nearby colleges including Penn State and Harrisburg Community College.

WORLD LANGUAGE: AP French, AP German, AP Latin, AP Chinese, AP Spanish & AP Spanish Literature. Five years of Latin, French, Spanish, Chinese and German, taught in the traditional and audio-lingual methods.

<u>MATHEMATICS:</u> AP Calculus AB and BC, AP Computer Science, AP Statistics Computer Science Programming, Pre-Algebra, Algebra 1 and 2, Geometry, Calculus. Pre-Calculus/Trig., Trig./Alg. 3, Business Math, Financial Algebra and semester course of Statistics.

SCIENCE: AP Physics 1 & C, AP Chemistry, AP Biology AP Environmental Science, Environmental Science, Biology, Physics, Conceptual Physics, Anatomy/Physiology, Topics in Applied Science, Chemistry I, Conceptual Chemistry, Astronomy, Biochemistry, IRIS (Independent Research in Science), Wildlife Biology & Ecology, Zoology & Botany, and Oceanography & Meteorology

SOCIAL STUDIES: AP Human Geography, AP European History AP World History AP Psychology, AP Government, AP Economics AP U.S. History, AP Comparative Government. World History is required in grade nine. Tenth, eleventh, twelfth grade students take a combination of Government, Economics, US History & Global Issues. Electives include Sociology, Psychology & Anthropology.

ENGLISH: AP English Lit. & Comp., AP English Language. English 9, 10, 11 and 12 must be taken by all students. American Literature 11, World Literature 12.

BUSINESS EDUCATION: Introduction to Business, Accounting 1 and 2, Entrepreneurship 1 and 2, Microsoft Office classes, Business Law, Cooperative Education, Web Page Design, Sports & Entertainment Marketing. Personal Money Mgt., All business courses are elective to all students. Also offered are internship opportunities.

ART & MUSIC: AP Art History, AP Studio Art Drawing, AP 2D, AP 3D are offered as well as 20 Art electives. AP Music Theory is offered as well as 19 additional Music courses.

<u>**TECHNOLOGY**</u> – Fifteen technology courses are available including Project Lead The Way (PLTW); Principals of Engineering, Civil Engineering, Digital Electronics, Engineering Design & Development, CAD.

ADDITIONAL ELECTIVES: Electives are offered in Family & Consumer Sciences, and our Agriculture Department. The school yearbook, school newspaper and school television station are also offered to all students as electives. A JROTC Program is offered with four levels.

VOCATIONAL COURSES: Cumberland Valley is a member of Cumberland-Perry Vocational Technical School. Selected students who elect this program will attend this school on a half-day basis in grades 9-12.
